The September Second Sunday Offering is addressing two international humanitarian crises and we are asking you to give generously. We will be supporting the UCC's relief efforts in Haiti and Lutheran Social Services' efforts to help Afghani refugees being resettled locally.

A UCC Haiti Appeal seeks to raise \$100,000 for immediate relief and longer-term recovery for the thousands of people in Haiti who are reeling from sequential disasters. These include the deadly, destructive 7.2 earthquake on August 14 in western Haiti, Tropical Depression Grace, and COVID-19. Vaccination of health care workers and people over 65 only got started in early August. Lutheran Social Services of the National Capital Area (LSSNCA) welcomes an influx of Afghan Allies as a result of the Biden Administration's evacuation of 2,500 individuals by September 11. Afghan allies and their families began arriving at Fort Lee, located outside of Richmond, VA, on July 30. It is expected that the majority will be resettled in the D.C. metro area. LSSNCA has set up an Operation Welcome Afghan Allies web page to respond to those interested in providing temporary housing, transportation, in-kind donations, storage space, and financial contributions. From the Moderator

Dear Members & Friends,

Please note the following important news about staff transitions.

Call to Permanent Ministry

As previously announced, this fall we are engaging in a process for calling the Reverend Amanda Hendler-Voss to be our permanent senior minister. Since March 2020, Amanda has served as our designated senior minister, a position that is limited by covenant to a term of three years. In the past year and a half—a time of extraordinary challenges due to the COVID-19 pandemic—we have witnessed and greatly benefited from Amanda's leadership, we have seen her immense talent and passion for social justice, and we have shared a deep and growing friendship. We are prepared now for a sacred conversation in anticipation of a call to permanent ministry.

The conversation will take place in three parts. *First*, the Designated Minister Relations Team (DMRT) will meet with Amanda to evaluate her ministry in light of the goals established in the Designated Ministry Covenant—(1) to continue walking on the path to become a multiracial and multicultural church; (2) to strengthen our church community; and (3) to develop consensus about the social justice issues to prioritize within the mission of the church—mindful of the many obstacles that disrupted Amanda's ministry from the start. If you would like to share your thoughts on any aspect of this evaluation, please contact any member of the DMRT by September 29, 2021. The DMRT members are Kim Darling, Katherine Antos, Hannah Higgins-Long, David Greer, Priscilla Waters, Susan Anderson and John Smeltzer.

Second, Council will meet October 5, 2021 to receive a report from DMRT. Council will then invite Amanda into conversation about her hopes and goals for permanent ministry and what she and we perceive to be the mission and role of First Church into the future. On October 17, 2021, we will convene a nurture after worship to continue this conversation about First Church today and First Church reimagined. The nurture will provide an opportunity for all members and friends of the church to share their hopes and dreams for the future of the church and to engage in conversation with Amanda about a shared vision for worship and mission in the coming years.

Third, we will convene for our Fall Congregational Meeting on October 24, 2021. We will then hold a discussion and vote on a nomination to call the Rev. Amanda Hendler-Voss to be our Senior

Minister. We anticipate holding the meeting in a hybrid manner (from the sanctuary and on zoom) to allow full participation. *Please* mark these dates on your calendar and plan to join us in these vital conversations about the ministry of the church.

Search for Director of Music Ministry

Our search for a new Director of Music Ministry (to replace John Horman, who retired at the end of June) is also well underway. The search committee recently posted an announcement and position description on the church's website and on selected job forums. The committee will be receiving applications through October 1, 2021. If you know any prospective candidates or persons who might be able to share the position announcement with prospective candidates, please direct them to our website ([here](#)).

Our goal is to select a new director of music ministry by Thanksgiving. But Council has asked the search committee to be deliberate, to maximize our chances of attracting high-quality candidates and securing the best person for the position. In accordance with our bylaws, the committee will select and bring a candidate to the congregation for the congregation's approval. If we do not have a candidate by the fall congregational meeting, Council may hire a candidate on a temporary basis to fill the vacancy, subject to ratification at our next congregational meeting (which would be our annual meeting in January). Until a new director of music is hired, we will continue to call on a talented pool of substitute musicians.

The search committee members are Marian Drake (chair), Kristy Goodfellow Mills, Andrew Hamilton, Michael Hopkins, Emily Laing, Priscilla Waters, and Jason Carson Wilson.
