ADVENT CANDLE LITURGY: HOPE Lois & Kurt Fischbeck

The Gospel of John speaks of Jesus on Christ as the true light coming into the world. In anticipation of that coming, we light candles for the four weeks of Advent leading to Christmas and reflect on the coming of Christ. It is significant that the church has always used that language—the *coming* of Christ—because it speaks to a deep truth. Christ is coming. Christ is always coming, always entering a troubled world, a wounded heart. So we light the first candle, the candle of Hope, and dare to express our longing for healing and the wellbeing of all creation.

(Candle of Hope is lit)

May this light remind us that the waiting itself is holy. Will you pray with me?

All: **Loving God, as we enter this Advent season, we open all the shadow places in our lives to the healing light of Christ. Show us the creative power of hope. Prepare our hearts to be transformed by you, so that we may walk in the light of Jesus Christ. Amen.**

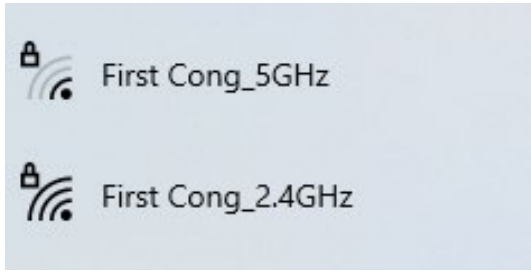

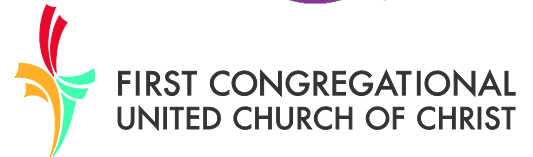

Welcome to First Congregational UCC. We were founded in 1865 by abolitionists as the first racially integrated church in Washington, D.C. In 1867 our mission committee played a prominent role in the founding of Howard University. The church has been located at its present site at 10th and G Streets NW since 1868. In more recent years, the church affirmed its vision as an Open and Affirming (ONA) Church (1987), a Just Peace Church (1985), Multiracial/Multicultural Church (2003), and an Anti-Racist Church (2021). Our new building, constructed according to Gold LEED standards, was dedicated in 2012. First Church continues to follow its faith journey into the future and to be a prophetic voice for the Spirit in the nation's capital.
